

These are just a few of the items that are readily accessible on the City of Oroville's new app for Androids and iPhones

Florist-delivered, store-bought, hand-grown — flowers can easily bring a smile. But the days when the entire landscape is sprinkled with tiny splashes of color from nature's hand are few. Now is the time to baby-step around the blooms on Table Mountain, just north of Oroville. As the weather heats up, these signs of spring will quickly come to the end of their life cycle.


A wildflower is a flower that grows in the wild, meaning it was not intentionally seeded or planted. Trying to predict the California wildflower season seems to be an almost futile task, with the final result depending on rainfall, temperature, wind and a host of other factors

The following is an excerpt from a blog tilted, "Natural History Wanderings" ... Lots of Lupine, Goldfields, Popcorn, and Poppies. Both good displays and many species in bloom. However, some plants are a little beaten up from the weather. It is quite damp in places and the bloom should continue as more rain is predicted. Some of the other species seen today were Blue Dicks, Johnny Tuck, Sandwort, Purple Owl's Clover, Glassy Wild Hyacinth, Table Mountain Meadowfoam, Dwarf Stonecrop, Oakwood Violet, Biscuit Root, Seep Monkey-flower, Yellow Carpet, Sky Lupine, Volcanic Onion, Cowboy Clover, White-tipped Clover, Bitter-root (Lewesia rediviva), Fiddlenecks, Spreading Larkspur, Kellogg's Monkey-flower, Buttercups, Dark-stained Prettyface, Valley Tassels, California Pipevine, Woodland Star (pink and White varieties), and Woody Mountain Jewel Flower. Most common names are from Wildflowers of Table Mountain.

On Saturday, April 4th the Feather River Recreation & Park District will is hosting the annual Wildflower & Nature Festival at Riverbend Park (Montgomery Street & Highway 70). The event starts at 9:00 A.M. and runs until 4:00 P.M. Lots of flower related activities and

displays, food, entertainment, kids activities, special presentations by the Lake Oroville Visitors Center and a shuttle bus up to the Table Mountain Flower Fields. There will also be an informational booth hosted by the Supplemental Benefits Fund seeking public opinion on

an Aquatic Center. Free packets of wildflower seeds will be available to those stopping by.

THE BENEFITS OF RECYCLING PHONEBOOKS

According to Los Gatos, California's Green Valley Recycling, if all Americans recycled their phonebooks for a year, we would save 650,000 tons of paper and free up two million cubic yards of landfill space. Modesto, California's Parks, Recreation & Neighborhoods Department, which lets city residents include phonebooks with their regular curbside pickup, says that for each 500 books recycled, we save:

- 7,000 gallons of water
- 3.3 cubic yards of landfill space
- 17 to 31 trees
- 4,100 kilowatts of electricity, enough to power an average home for six months



Consumers trying to do the right thing should find out when and how their town or phone company will accept phonebooks for recycling. Some will only take phonebooks back at certain times of year, often when new books are being distributed. Some

schools, echoing the "newspaper drives" of bygone days, run contests in which students bring old phonebooks to school where they are then collected and sent off to recyclers.

If You Can't Recycle, Reuse

But those whose towns won't accept phonebooks at all and who can't find anywhere else to drop them need not fret.



Old phonebooks have many practical uses. Their pages make excellent fire starters in a wood-burning fireplace or outdoor fire pit. Balled up or shredded phonebook pages also make nice packaging filler in place of problematic polystyrene "peanuts." Phonebook pages can also be shredded and used as mulch to keep weeds down in your garden. The paper is biodegradable and will eventually return back to the soil.



MEET THE FISHES OF THE LAKE OROVILLE AREA ... Known as the best Bass lake in Califor-




