The Feather River Fish Hatchery proudly conducts tours of the facility during the Salmon Festival each year to allow the public to see the operation "Close-up". A little bit of history about how and why this incredible facility was built ...

When Oroville Dam was constructed, several miles of spawning and nursery grounds were no longer available for salmon and steelhead trout returning to their home stream to deposit eggs. To compensate for the loss, the hatchery was built in 1967, planned cooperatively by the Department of Fish & Wildlife and the California Department of Water Resources.

The main hatchery houses the spawning operation and incubators. The facility can accommodate 9,000 adult salmon and 2,000 adult steel-head. Incubators can hold 20 million eggs, and 9.6 million fingerlings can be reared in the eight concrete raceways.

At the base of the fish barrier dam, salmon and steelhead enter and climb the ladder to the hatchery gathering tank. During their spawning runs, the fish can be seen through special view windows as they climb the fish ladder to reach the hatchery. Fall-run salmon and steelhead arrive from September through November and the spring-running salmon begin arriving in June.

Oroville's Salmon Festival officially started in 1994 when Freda Flint a long-time local resident, while working at the Chamber of Commerce, came up with the "idea" that Oroville needed to celebrate the annual return of the salmon. The first event was small in comparison to the event that has steadily grown each year now attracting over 20,000 people to the Feather River Fish Hatchery, events on the levee and the Historic Downtown District. A PROCLAMATION IN RECOGNITION AND APPRECIATION OF CARL "BUD" BOLT AND POSTHUMOUSLY TO LAILA BOLT

WHEREAS, the City of Oroville's story has been marked by the service of many volunteers, including generations of selfless individuals, from all walks of life, each dedicated to making tomorrow a better day; and

WHEREAS, it was many years ago, in 1952, that two sweethearts, Bud and Laila Bolt, discovered a passion and vision of sharing their love of antique tools with friends and family and later, to their surprise, the world; and

WHEREAS, Bud Bolt began his career working for Snap-On Tools, one of the world's first revolutionary tool suppliers, peddling tools of the decade to the masses; and

WHEREAS, during this time, Bud and Laila took pride in show-casing their "hobby", a collection of antique tools, through demonstrations to local school children, as well as in the garage of their home to friends and visitors alike; and

WHEREAS, wanting to share their growing hobby with the community, in 2003 Bud & Laila began negotiations with the City of Oroville to provide a permanent museum to display the collection. On, January 4, 2005, the City Council accepted a donation from the Bolt's consisting of about 4,000 items, related books, reference materials, a computer data base and other related items establishing the Bolt's Antique Tool Museum; and



WHEREAS, recognizing that the donations, and the newly created museum, would require significant "manpower" to keep it up and running, both Bud & Laila Bolt continued with their labor of love by providing their precious time to not only run the museum, but to organize it and to staff it with many more Docent volunteers. The museum has grown exponentially and currently has over 13,000 items, is open seven days a week, maintains a series of monthly informative lectures, is host to many visiting club events, has been widely published, most recently in the Journal of Antiques and Collectables, and has maintained an impressive, stand-alone website, with over 6,850,976 "hits"; and

WHEREAS, the heartfelt generosity and spirit of Bud & Laila Bolt and their tireless daily dedication to the museum will forever remain a beacon in the community of Oroville and for many generations to come.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Linda Dahlmeier, Mayor of the City of Oroville, in concurrence with the Oroville City Council, do hereby recognize Carl "Bud" & posthumously Laila Bolt for their loyal and dedicated service to the community of Oroville for so many, many years and extend this expression of pride and appreciation for the many historical, social and economic benefits that our community has enjoyed over the years due to one couples love for collecting and sharing of antique tools and memorabilia.
