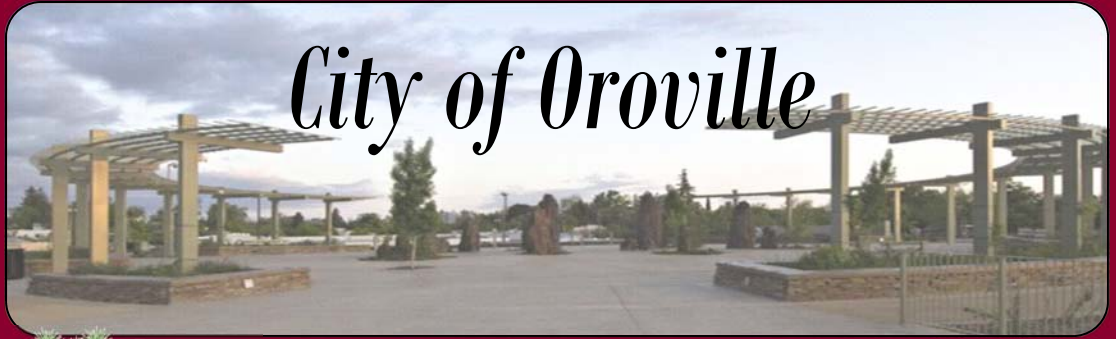

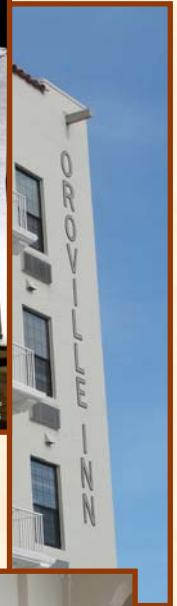

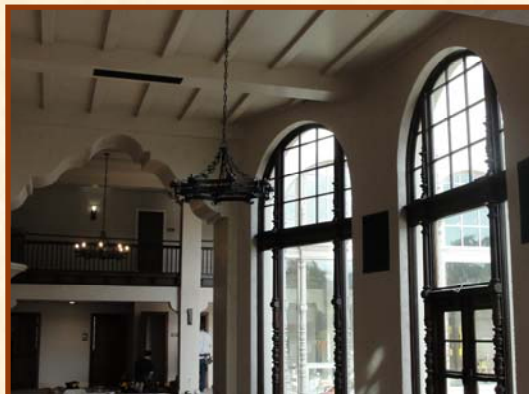
## Meet the “new” Oroville Inn

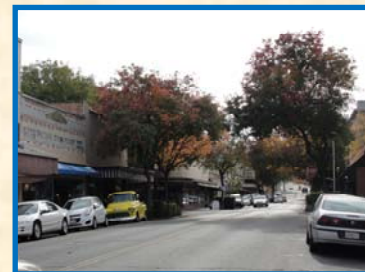

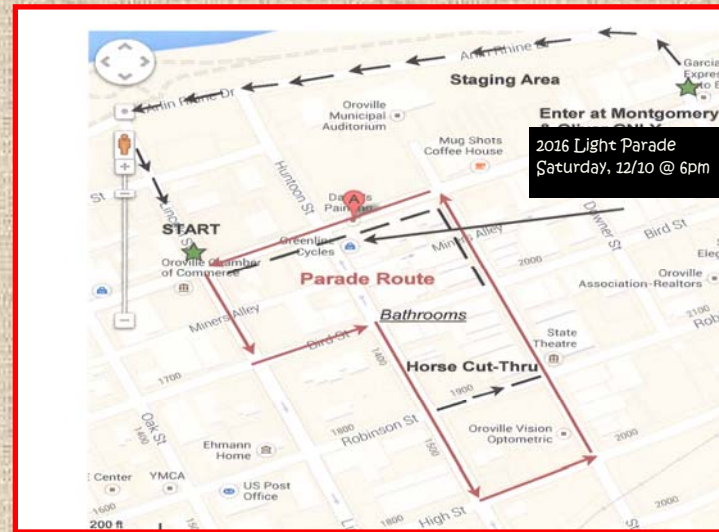
