

Small Town ... but lots to discover & explore!



Oroville traces its roots to 1808 when Gabriel Moraga, the first known visitor to this area, viewed the lush green valley with groves of oak trees, wild game, shy native Indians and an unnamed tree lined river. In 1820 Capitan Luis Arguello explored the area and named the river "Rio de las Plumas", the River of Feathers.

Oroville is situated on the banks of the Feather River where it flows out of the Sierra Nevada onto the flat floor of the California Central Valley towards the Bay Area to the Delta and beyond.

Bolt's Antique Tool Museum 1650 Broderick Street Daily 10:00 — 3:45

Come explore a unique collection of over 20,000 tools dating back to the 1820's. As you wander through the museum, you will not only view tools, but enjoy pictures of earlier times and see the tools "in action"

Pioneer History Museum

2332 Montgomery Street Fri-Sat & Sunday Noon — 4:00

Enjoy a step back in time and explore over 6000 square feet of displays containing artifacts from the early pioneers who settled in Oroville and Butte County.

C.F. Lott Home in Sank Park 1067 Montgomery Street Fri-Sun-Mon 11:30 — 4:00

Visit a charming Victorian home, circa 1856 with a captivating history. The home and gardens encompass one square block. Costumed Docents provide a glimpse into a less complicated lifestyle and era.

Feather River Nature Center & Native Plant Park

Montgomery Roundabout & Old Ferry Road

(Currently closed due to road erosion from the February Spillway incident)

Historic WPA Bath-house rescued & restored with nature displays, artifacts, minerals & native plants. Incredible views of the Diversion Dam, Fish Barrier Dam & the Feather River.

Chinese Temple & Museum Complex

1500 Broderick Street Daily 12:00 — 4:00

This enchanting museum includes three active Temples representing the major ways of life in China. The complex includes five separate buildings displaying priceless artifacts.

The Ehmann Home

1480 Lincoln Street Saturdays 11 - 3 & by appointment

On May 16, 2017 a letter from the Oroville City Council was sent to President Donald J. Trump outlining the spillway incident and how it has affected the City and the Greater Oroville Region. Events surrounding the incident continue to be captured by the local, national and global media. The good news is that the rebuilding of the spillway has begun and the independent forensic investigation will ultimately shed light on what went wrong and why.

Summer water-conserving tips for your garden: ... as the temperature increases to keep your grass or your garden alive and your water bill in check try a few, or all, of this tips: (1) Don't over-water; (2) Don't waste water; (3) Make sure mulch doesn't crust over; (4) Test for moisture; (5) If you can, water in the morning; (6) Focus on your front yard; (7) Use cool water; and (8) Water at widely spaced intervals.


