How to set up your Disposal area

Avoid additional fees from contamination and missed collections by following these best practices:

- Containers are labeled: Clearly mark recycling, organics, and waste containers by using different colors and signage.
- Equal access to all three streams: Make sure all three containers (recycling, organics, and garbage) are next to each other and easily accessible for resident use.



- Collect recyclables and organics at other commonly visited locations, including common areas, playgrounds, laundry rooms, mail depots, and management offices.
- Ensure that containers are visible and accessible to both residents and haulers and that signage is posted near/behind the containers.
- Use gates, walls, and plants to provide screening and discourage nonresident usage of the containers and minimize contamination.
- If there are any broken or vandalized containers, please contact Recology for replacements.



Inform and Engage Your Residents and Staff

Let tenants and employees know your recycling plans even before the containers arrive. An ongoing outreach strategy also is important.

Here are some ideas to get you started:

- Plan a potluck, picnic, or open house to create awareness about recycling at your complex.
- Publish an article about recycling and organics collection in your newsletter.
- Distribute fliers to each apartment with information on the location of recycling and organics containers and tips to recycle.



- Use e-mail, a website, and social media to provide information, updates, and photos.
- Include information on recycling and organics collection in the move-in letter to new tenants. You'll find a sample letter on page six of this packet.

Informational signs and posters should be kept current and posted in common areas such as laundry rooms, mail depots, workout centers, and the manager's office.

Here are some tips for effective signs:

- Make them easy to read with simple graphics and colors.
- If you have residents whose primary language is not English, translate your educational materials.



- Signs should include clear information on what can and cannot be recycled. Styrofoam, plastic bags / packaging, and drinking glasses are commonly mistaken as recyclables.
- Signs should also include instructions on making sure recyclables are **Empty, Clean, & Dry**.
- Photos and illustrations can help explain what goes in recycling containers.

Welcome to Your New Home!

Dear Resident,

We take pride in creating a clean and healthy environment for everyone in the City of Oroville (& beyond) and you can help by separating your recycling and organics correctly. Your property manager should gift you with a free recycling guide and a food scraps pail. If not, reach out to them to inquire for one.



Why is it important to separate recyclables and organics correctly?

- Diverts waste from the landfill and conserves valuable resources.
- It is more economical to reuse our natural resources than to create new products from raw materials.
- Reduces the cost of garbage disposal.

Help us keep costs down and make our community cleaner and greener! Make sure your efforts don't go to waste by remembering these simple rules:

- Know what goes where. Visit Recology.com to learn more.
- Empty, clean, & dry recyclables before placing them in the recycle bin (use 3 seconds of water total, shake or air dry, and put the lid back on).
- Don't bag recyclables. Place loose recyclables into the container.
- Dirty and soiled (and cheap) paper belongs in compost.

Food Scrap Collection Now Available

Dear Resident,

We are pleased to announce our new organics program. We are excited to help the environment and the local Oroville Community by reducing our landfill waste and creating a product that is used to help regenerate our soil and food sources.

Three steps to successful home collection of food scraps:

1



Collect food scraps while preparing meals, scraping plates, and/or cleaning out the refrigerator of spoiled food. Include paper towels, napkins, paper plates, and pizza boxes (make sure to take out any plastic pizza saver/tables, they go in the garbage).

2



Empty your kitchen food scraps pail, including all soiled paper, and any vegetative waste into your green organics container. No plastic bags including those that are "compostable" are allowed in the green organics container.

3



We'll take it from here! We haul your food and green waste to a local facility and within 60 days, it is made into rich compost that is used throughout the community and beyond to help regenerate the soil.



Remember that all food waste including meat and bones can go in your curbside organics container. Check out **whatbin.com** or **cityoforoville.org/services** for more information



How to Properly Sort Recyclables and Organics

Please note: Plastic bags jam sorting equipment and can cause the entire recycling facility to shut down. Do **NOT** put recyclables in plastic bags! Use a reusable bag or bin to carry out and empty recycycable directly into the cart.



RECYCLING

Plastic # 1, #2, and #5, metal, clean paper and cardboard, and glass.



COMPOST

All food scraps (meat, bones, & veggies), soiled paper (paper towels, pizza boxes, napkins, & plates), yard trimmings (leaves, grass, branches).



LANDFILL

Plastic bags & film, plastic utensils, straws, wrappers, food grade Styrofoam, dishes, hoses, and dog and cat waste.









8 Items That Do NOT Belong in the **Recycle or Organic Containers**



If you bag your recycling and/or organics it will not be able to be processed and thus end up in the landfill. Recycling must be loose, clean, and dry to be recycled. When in doubt, find out! Knowing what goes where keeps costs down.

These items are often mistakenly put in the recycle or organics containers. Learn to properly dispose of them.

Landfill

Throw away in the garbage container.

PLASTIC BAGS, FILM & CUTLERY



All plastic bags and packaging, utensils, and straws are garbage. Even if they have a "recycling symbol" on them they are not all recyclable, the symbol is just a resin code showing what type of plastic it is.

STYROFOAM



Styrofoam food ware or packaging is not allowed in the recycle or organics containers.

DOG / CAT WASTE



Dog, cat, and human waste belong in the garbage. Placing them in the organics or recycling container is a contamination violation.

Textiles/Clothes



Clothes/textiles (i.e. carpet) cannot be recycled in your recycling or organic container. They can be recycled/downcycled by donating them to a non-profit.

Drop-Off HHW Facilities



The items below **CANNOT** be thrown in the garbage, recycle, or organics containers.

BATTERIES



Batteries are hazardous waste and can cause a fire in collection trucks and/or at the processing facility if disposed of incorrectly.

PAINT



Paint must be taken to a Household Hazardous Waste Facility. Also select retailers will take back fresh leftover paint: paintcare.org/state/ California.

ELECTRONIC WASTE



Electronic waste must be recycled separately due to the large number of hazardous components that must be removed for separate treatment.

FLUORESCENT LIGHT BULBS



Fluorescent light bulbs contain mercury so must be properly disposed of to ensure the safety and welfare of everyone.

Unlimited drop off of all clean mixed recyclables is available to the public for a \$15 fee.

ELECTRONIC WASTE



Includes microwaves, T.V.'s, computer monitors and towers, cell phones, Ipods, DVD players, stereos, etc. There is a fee for non-CRT items, please call ahead for more information.

SHARPS



Sharps must be in a sealed and secure containers and dropped off at the Sharps kiosk adjacent to the Recology Office.

MATTRESSES AND BOX SPRINGS



Drop off mattresses and/or box springs for free. Limit 2 items per customer.

The following Items are accepted on: the 1st and 3rd Friday of each month 9 am to 2 pm

PAINT



You can recycle unwanted house paint, solvents, thinners, and adhesives. Both latex and oil based products are accepted. There is a 15 gallon limit.

BATTERIES



Household and lead acid auto batteries (EV batteries are not accepted) are accepted including (Alkaline, Ni-Cad, & Lithium)

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE



Includes, flammables, corrosives, toxics, oxidizers, propane tanks and smoke detectors. Visit the website for a full list of acceptable materials.

FLUORESCENT LIGHT BULBS



The HHW facility takes up to 4 feet of fluorescent tubes and 15 CFL bulbs free of charge.



It's important to monitor and track your recycling and organics program to assure success:



- Maintain recycling and organics sites and check for litter, contamination, and the condition of signs.
- Continue outreach and education to tenants and staff as required by SB 1383.

Checklist for a Successful Multi-family Recycling & Orgaincs Program

- ✓ Is recycling and organics collection as convenient as trash disposal?
- ✓ Is signage visible and understandable?
- \checkmark Do residents have enough information about the recycling and organics collection system?
- ✓ Does the recycling and organics program have management and staff support?
- ✓ Are maintenance staff and leasing agents trained to answer questions and promote recycling and organics collection?
- ✓ Is the program adequately monitored for cleanliness and to prevent contamination, overflow, and trash?
- ✓ Are accurate records kept to determine true cost or savings?
