SPOTLIGHTING OROVILLE'S SAFETY STAFF...

The City of Oroville's police and fire personnel serve the 14,490 citizens of our city. The Police Department had its beginnings in 1906 and was headed by a

Town Marshal. In 1940, Ole Lund became the first police chief. The Fire Department traces its origins back to 1856 and was one of the first departments in California. Both departments have been headquartered in many locations within the city, including the current City Hall building. In 1984 the departments were moved to the current safety complex which is located at 2055 Lincoln Street. The Police Department recently




received a \$282,000 grant from the Department of Justice to modernize the emergency response equipment. The Fire Department also received CBG/Program Income funds of \$900,000 to purchase two new off-road fire trucks. Through community partnership, we promise to work, diligently everyday to reduce the incidence of crime and improve the quality of life. Our mandate is to do so with honor and integrity, while at all times conducting ourselves with the highest ethical standards to maintain public confidence.

The department has many programs including, Vehicle Abatement, Student Mentorship, Safety Fair, DUI Checkpoints, Alcohol/Tobacco Education, Bicycle Rodeo, Every 15 Minutes, Safe from the Start, National Night Out, Child Safety Seat Checkup, Landlord/Tenant Training, and Operation Stop Fraudulent Check Program. The department also provides support to many other city events and programs. It also participates fully with the Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force (BINTF) which aggressively enforces the drug laws.

The department was established in 1856, and today consists of 17 full time personnel who responded to 3,651 calls this past year. The preservation of Life and Property is also enhanced with the Oroville Automatic Aid Agreement with Butte County Fire, California Department of Fire and Forestry, and the El Medio Fire Department.

Bicycle Transportation Plan (BTP) The Oroville Urban Area is very attractive to bicyclists because of the relatively flat terrain, favorable climate, and the natural beauty. The BTP is a document used by the city that ultimately becomes part of the Regional Transportation Plan. Once in place, the city can apply for funding to enhance and establish bike routes which provide an alternative

Supplemental Benefits Fund (SBF)


The Supplemental Benefits Fund was established as part of the relicensing of the Lake Oroville Facilities as a benefit to the Greater Oroville Community. The fund was the culmination of a six-year collaborative process between the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) and more than forty stakeholder groups representing hundreds of interests to benefit, environmental, recreational, cultural, land use, and operations resources. During the five years of negotiating, the stakeholders submitted over 550 proposals for consideration. The main focus of the bestowed \$61,270,000 is to benefit the Oroville Community with recreation and economic development opportunities.

The Steering Committee is comprised of five voting members, three of which are City of Oroville Council Members and two of which are Feather River Recreation and Park District (FRRPD) Board Members. There are also four non-voting/advisory members representing the Department of Water Resources, State Water Contractors, American Rivers and the Oroville Area Chamber of Commerce. The City of Oroville serves as the Fund Administrator.

In 2008, the Steering Committee received requests from 34 potential projects, 10 of these were approved. They include: Riverbend North Soccer Fields \$1,020,000; Table Mountain Golf Course Irrigation Repairs \$30,000; Oroville Gone Wild \$5,000; The Pottery Project \$4,400; YMCA Swimming Pool Repairs

\$5,000; Metal Sculpture Project \$5,000; City Fire Water Rescue Equipment \$4,637; Chinese Brick Building/Bolt Museum Landscaping \$4,000; and the Oroville Library Community Room Refurbishing \$4,835.

A Regional Fund Strategic Plan is currently being developed, which will be used to guide the SBF Steering Committee with future planning and funding efforts. Meetings are held at City Hall on the first Wednesday of each quarter at 5:30 p.m. The public is encouraged to attend. Completed in 2007, the Centennial Plaza is a destination not to miss. It is located within easy walking distance of the historic downtown. You can also drive up either Lincoln Street or Huntoon Street to the parking area to begin enjoying the beauty of the plaza. As you meander through the environmentally friendly walkways, stop at each of the Interpretative Panels made of porcelain

enamel steel containing historical area information.

The plaza is part of a long term vision for the revitalization of the historic downtown area. It offers the base for the many opportunities that the bordering Feather River provides to the community. Ultimately, the entire levy area will connect the Fish Hatchery to the east, and all that Bedrock Park and Riverbend Park offer to the west. The planned Gateway Project at Montgomery Street & Feather River Blvd and the future walking and bicycle paths will be a final enhancement to the plan.

A Proposition 40 grant of \$3,000,000 and Redevelopment Agency Funds of \$300,000 helped build the plaza. Please enjoy & share it!



door seating and parking is available. An outdoor patio will be open soon. The restaurant staff invites you to stop by and enjoy the endless chip basket.





OROVILLE STATE THEATER

The State Theater opened in 1928 with a seating capacity of 1,529 and was originally equipped with a Wurlitzer organ. The theater was purchased by the City of Oroville in 1983. There has been a continuous renovation program occurring with the ultimate plan to restore it to it's 1928 grandeur. The current seating capacity is 608 on the main floor. Once the balcony is

fully stored the theater will seat 1000. The State Theatre has the potential to be a fabulous anchor to the downtown area as the "Oroville State Theater Performing Arts Center."

GENERAL PLAN UPDATE...

California State law requires all cities and counties to have a long-range plan for their physical development. A General Plan is, in its simplest form, a statement by local citizens of what is in the best interests of their community. The General Plan functions as a guide to the type

of community that is desired for the future and provides the means by which the community may achieve that desired future. The City of Oroville General Plan provides the fundamental basis for land use, development and conservation policy. It represents the basic community values, ideals and aspirations that will govern the City through 2030. The General Plan addresses all aspects of development including: land use; community character; circulation and transportation; open space; natural resources and conservation; public facilities and services; safety, and noise.

We are currently working on responding to comments submitted during the public review period. A determination regarding

how the City will address Baseline Green-House Gas Emission requirements is also in process. These responses will be incorporated in the Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR). It is anticipated that the final plan will be presented to the City Council for review and action during the second quarter of 2009.

WATER CONSERVATION TIPS...

- Winter & rainy weather still requires your awareness...
- **Drop that Drip!** Dripping faucets and leaky pipes are among the worst water-wasting offenders.
- **The Final Flow**. Low-flush toilets and low-flow showerheads help to ensure conservation by restricting the volume of water involved in each flush or during each shower.
- Running Nowhere. Make sure to turn off water during periods of non-use, while brushing your teeth, for example. If washing or rinsing dishes by hand, adjust the flow of water to a small stream so that the majority of water goes where you need it to, and doesn't escape down the drain.
- **The Wash on Washers.** Using an updated and energy-efficient washing machine, in addition to washing full loads, can drastically improve water conservation. Energy-efficient front-loaders can cut water consumption by almost a whopping 40%.
- Watering Time. Water early in the day so your watering efforts are maximized and evaporation does not occur too quickly, which can dry out your plants.
- Catching the Rain. Diverting storm gutters into rain barrels allows you to catch un-used rainwater that can then be used to water plants and vegeta-
