CITY SCORES GRANT FOR NEW BASKETBALL COURTS...



The City of Oroville, through a partnership with the Private Industry Council (PIC) At-Risk Youth Program, applied for a \$61,000 grant from the Stewardship Council Youth Investment Program. The grant request was recently approved and steps are being taken to get the project underway soon.

The approved grant will be used to purchase materials and pay for the construction of 3 1/2 youth-sized, ADA accessible courts and amenities. The new basketball courts will be located in Hewitt Park* Hammon Park* and Rotary Park*. Additionally, funds will be used to refurbish the existing half basketball court at the Oroville YMCA*.

The total cost of the project, set at \$99,546, will be paid for by the grant and \$31,046 in Parks Development Impact Fees approved by the City Council, and \$7,500 in In-Kind Labor expenses from the Private Industry Council.

The basketball courts located at the City parks will be free to the public and open from sunrise to sunset. The YMCA court will be available to youth that are enrolled in the YMCA's various programs.

Additional partnerships are planned with local agencies which will provide volunteer coaches and referees for basketball teams. All parks are within walking distance for neighborhood youth which is an added benefit of this active sport.

Basketball traces its origins to 1891 when Dr. James Naismith, a PE coach at the YMCA, was trying to keep his gym class fit on rainy days. He used a peach basket as the first "hoop."

Taking a break from hectic schedules or just doing something different can put a whole new spin on your life. The Oroville area has seemingly endless possibilities...all one needs to do is look at the beautiful Feather River, go to one of the many City and FRRPD parks, stroll along the levee, drop by Centennial Plaza. Even walking through the local museums and the Historic Downtown area provide an opportunity for rest and recreation.

Disc golf (also known as Frisbee golf or "frolf") is a disc game in which individual players throw a flying disc into a basket or at a target. According to the Professional Disc Golf Association, "The object of the game is to traverse a course from beginning to end in the fewest number of throws of the disc." Disc golf is inexpensive and is physically accessible for all ages and athletic ranges and therefore attracts a diverse range of players. The game is played in the United States and in more than 20 other countries around the

world. Oroville has a great (free) disc golf course which is located in Riverbend Park at the west end of Montgom-

ery Street. After your "round" enjoy a picnic or continue your recreation by walking or biking the clean paved trails that meander along the beautiful Feather River through



Bedrock Park and down to the Feather River Fish Hatchery. **Have fun!**


Water, our most precious commodity ...


Most of us take for granted that all we have to do is turn on the faucet when we need water. Water conservation is essential year-round even here in

Supplemental Benefits Fund News ...

The Supplemental Benefits Fund (SBF) Steering Committee recently

approved the *Regional Fund Strategic Plan* a key component of managing the fund. The SBF was created as



part of the licensing negotiations for Lake Oroville and may have a long term value of \$61,270,000 once the new license is approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. As funds are made available, the public will be notified and a grant process will begin. The SBF is administered by the City of Oroville and has voting

members from the City Council and Feather River Recreation Parks District (FRRPD). The largest grant to date was to FRRPD for \$1,020,000 which is being used to build three all purpose

soccer fields at Riverbend Park which are currently under construction.

BUSINESS ASSISTANCE & HOUSING

Funds are available through the City's Housing Rehabilitation Program. This is a great program for Senior Citizens and others on a fixed income to acquire funds for things like a new roof, insulation, bathroom updating, flooring, electrical, heating and air conditioning, new appliances, and other qualifying items. The home must be owner occupied and within the city limits of Oroville. Loans, up to \$60,000, at an interest rate of 3% are available. FIRE DEPARTMENT

Once again all residents are reminded to check their smoke alarms and to replace the batteries. With the spring rains comes tall grass, residents are reminded to clear their property as required. CODE ENFORCEMENT (CE)

FINANCE

The Finance Department processes all Business Licenses, Bus Passes, and prepares over 700 checks per month . All financial records of the City are also maintained by this department of four.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The City recently completed a \$2,177,255 road overlay project on several streets. The work was done by Knife River Construction Company. Funding for this long needed project came from \$1.0mm in Federal Stimulus Funds and \$1.5mm in accrued local and state road funds. The work included modifications to traffic flow and repairing physical conditions that will add 10 to 15 years of service to the roads. Also watch for improved landscaping along Highway 70.

The Wal-Mart Super Store planned for Feather River Blvd. is in the final EIR stages.

ADMINISTRATION

Administration is working closely with the office of Senator Aanestad on legislation that is designed to create new jobs and new business opportunities in the Oroville Enterprise Zone. Downtown Commercial Neighborhood Meetings have started which will provide a basis for information exchange and focused improvements.

PARKS, TREES & PUBLIC WORKS


The National Arbor Day Foundation named the City as "Tree City USA" for the 30th consecutive year. City staff maintains over 10,000 trees that are within the City limits. 330 feet of sidewalks have been replaced in the downtown area, 45 street signs installed, graffiti cleanup, street repairs and road ditches cleaned, storm drain maintenance, as well as regular street, parks, and museum maintenance.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Interim Police Chief Perry Reniff plans on developing a volunteer program, similar to the Sheriff's S.T.A.R. program which will be of great assistance to our community.

The Department is also in the process of upgrading the current 911 call system to one that will provide increased response times. The upgrade is part of a regional goal which will put all 911 systems on the same program allowing an interchange of staff from City and County call-centers when needed.
