CITY HALL IMPROVEMENTS CONTINUE

The City Council recently approved the design for the remodeling of the Council Chambers. The design provides a semi-circular seating arrangement for the council, city staff, and those attending the meetings which will provide increased visibility and interaction. The new layout also includes an upgraded video and recording system, electronic voting, and control of microphones and the speaker system. Improvements to ADA standards are included as well as securing the restroom facilities and adjacent staff work areas. The completed project will provide an efficient use of space incorporating green design guidelines which represents the culture of the City of Oroville.

Employee work areas throughout City Hall are also being brightened up with warm decorative paint colors, new flooring, and restroom improvements. Funding for the project is part of a USDA Rural Development Loan that the City secured in 2005 for the remodel and expansion of City Hall.


