If this isn't enough on Sunday, May 13th continues with the 63rd annual El Medio Mother's Day ham dinner at the El Medio Fire Station.

The **Feather** River Rowing Club is in the process of organizing a variety of programs for the Oroville Forebay Aquatic Center. including boating safety instruction for kayaks, sail boats, canoes, paddle boards, windsurfers and rowing. Additionally the grant provides scholarship funds for introductory programs such as: Sitting on Top of a Kayak, Canoeing, Windsurfing, Sculling, Sweep Rowing, Stand-up Paddling, High School Rowing Camp and Youth Aquatic Camp. Details about the programs to be offered and the scholarships will be released at a later date.

The Center is located at the Thermalito North Forebay State Park off Hwy 70 (Garden Drive exit) in Oroville. In addition to the aquatic center the Forebay State Park has picnic pavilions, large grassy areas, water access, ADA compliant restroom facilities and a large

Did you know? There are more than 278 California State Parks adventures which feature nearly 15,000 campsites, 3000 miles of trails, 625 miles of rivers and lake fronts and 280 miles of majestic coastline. BUT, DID YOU KNOW THAT HERE IN OROVILLE we have access to over 167 miles of lake shore, the incredible Feather River, boat launches, 110 miles of bike trails, 275 campgrounds, an equestrian camp, equestrian trails, floating campgrounds, hunting areas, a shooting range, seven historic museums, the Oroville Wildlife Refuge Area, the historic Bidwell Bar Bridge, and the Lake Oroville Visitors Center. The latest addition to Oroville's stellar attractions is a new trail above the North Thermalito Forebay. Pedestrians and those with mobility scooters can enjoy the relatively flat Rattlesnake Hill Trail that winds about a mile, starting and finishing at the water. Another breath-taking vista awaits you!



FLOATING CAMPSITE ON LAKE OROVILLE

The City of Oroville continues to look at innovative ways for the public to communicate with the city and the app method is now available. The American

Dialect Society which meets annually to bring our vocabulary up-to-date decided in 2011 that "app" was the word of the year. According to the society, app is "Short for Application; a program for a phone or computer or other electronic device." At last count there were more that 350,000 apps floating around somewhere in space waiting for the computer-savvy to download them into wallet-sized phones and personal computers. Now the City of Oroville counts itself in those numbers and provides instant access 7/24 to its constituents.

Seen a shopping cart lingering on the street or sidewalk? Noticed a pot hole, tree down, graffiti? Want to send a message to the Mayor, City Council, City Administrator or a Department Manager? Interested in visiting a park or museum? See a loose animal? Need a map of the city? These are just a few of the items that are readily accessible on the City of Oroville's new app for Androids and iPhones

For those with an iPhone simply go to the App Store on your phone, type in City of Oroville and download the app. If you have an Android go the Market Place on your phone, type in City of Oroville and download the app.

If you don't have an iPhone or an Android but have a computer you can access the app by entering http://obimobile/ Oroville in your URL. City Administrator, G. Harold Duffey encourages use of this simple and valuable tool that provides easy access to city services.
